## Whether a girl is bullied or a bully herself, *American Heritage Girls* stands firmly against 'bullying of any sort'

**CINCINNATI, Ohio** — October is <u>National Bullying Prevention Month</u>, and *American Heritage Girls (AHG, www.americanheritagegirls.org*) — one of the largest Christian, scout-type organizations in the world — has a plethora of resources to help equip parents and leaders with the tools to not only empower their girls to stand up to bullies in Christ-like ways, but also address their girls who might *be* the bullies.

AHG Founder and Executive Director Patti Garibay said, "At AHG, we do not condone bullying of any sort. We proudly empower girls by teaching them the importance of rooting themselves in Christ so that the fruit of the Holy Spirit is evident in their leadership style.

"The 'mean girl' is an age-old trope. TV and movies perpetuate the stereotype of the female bully. Have you noticed how most women are quick to put other women down, starting even in girlhood? Why is that?"

Garibay explained, "Just as any other form of bullying, being a mean girl is typically deep-seated in insecurity, shame, and fear. Bullying puts up a wall around her heart, but there is something that can break it down — namely, Some-One. God's love is the giant bucket of ice water that can put out the fire of a mean girl. The Psalms tell us 'He heals the brokenhearted.' When a bully recognizes that she is accepted and loved as she is, without the need for scare tactics or coercion, she can end the charade and walk in love."

For parents of girls who might struggle with fear regarding bullying, *AHG* proudly offers "<u>A Raising Godly</u> <u>Girls Guide to Putting Faith Over Fear</u>." The helpful guide gives parents and leaders tools and tips for how to encourage their girls to stand strong in the face of fear and focus on Christ. For girls struggling with bullies or who are bullies themselves — the powerful devotional questions and action steps are a great way to start the conversation about fear and how to appropriately channel any fears and anxieties.

American Heritage Girls was founded in 1995 when Founder and Executive Director Patti Garibay became concerned with the direction the Girl Scouts of America was headed. Garibay, along with a group of concerned parents, wanted a faith-based, scout-type character development program for their daughters, and American Heritage Girls was born. Today, there are Troops in all 50 states and girls being served in 15 countries around the globe. Girls can join a Troop at any time; if a Troop is not available nearby, they can become a Trailblazer and enjoy the AHG program alongside their parent. A variety of Christian denominations are also represented as Charter Organizations for Troops. Thousands of volunteer members across the country are helping girls grow in their faith, cultivate a heart for service, enjoy the great outdoors, and have more fun than they can imagine.

At *AHG*, girls ages five to 18 meet together as <u>a single Troop</u> at the same time and then break out into Units by Levels. This gives *AHG* girls the important social experience of interacting with friends and godly mentors of various ages; members also learn leadership skills within a group setting. *AHG* Troops are located in <u>local</u> <u>communities</u> across the nation. If none exists in a given area, families can bring the *AHG* Program to their own area. An *American Heritage Girls* Troop Development Coach is available to provide resources to potential Charter Organizations and other families to form <u>a new Troop</u>.
