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Girls today experience higher rates of diagnosed anxiety than ever before; they need God's help

CINCINNATI, Ohio — In this paradoxical world where technology creates more time for leisure and relaxation than ever before, almost 32% of all youth have been clinically diagnosed with an anxiety disorder. It's also shown that girls are 38% more likely to suffer from anxiety and worry.

"With all that is going on in our world today, it's no surprise that today's teens are experiencing the effects of worry, along with its parent cause, fear, in unprecedented numbers," says Patti Garibay, founder and executive director of American Heritage Girls (AHG, www.americanheritagegirls.org). "Fear is debilitating. It manifests itself in a variety of unhealthy behaviors, causing many sleepless nights."

Fear is part of the human condition, but as part of the Body of Christ, <u>Christians are called to faith over fear</u>. God has provided reassurance to Christians in the Bible, telling them not to fear. The Lord warns Christians that fear that results in worry is not from Him; it is from the adversary. Teaching girls to focus and trust in God allows their faith and confidence in His Word to become bigger and their fears to dwindle.

Garibay's recent op-ed highlights the major issues facing a girl today: diagnosed anxiety, worst-case scenario thinking, panic attacks, worrying, feelings of inadequacy, fear of the future, and struggling to find her place.

An *American Heritage Girls* Troop Development Coach is available to provide resources to potential Charter Organizations and other families to form <u>a new Troop</u>. Thousands of volunteer members across the country are helping girls grow in their faith, cultivate a heart for service, enjoy the great outdoors, and have more fun than they can imagine.
