## AHG equips families to overcome patterns of abuse and trauma to ensure a better future for girls

CINCINNATI, Ohio — Children don't just inherit their parent's genetic traits like eye color or height, but also their emotional and spiritual traumas. Generational trauma affects children from a young age, coloring a child's perspective and worldview. While some traumas can be easily identified, others are more subtle yet still powerful enough to seriously impact an individual. Trauma itself can contribute to poverty, compromised parenting, diminished attachment, chronic stress and unstable living environments, which can directly impact children and their development. Parents who have identified any potential pitfalls may want to address the issues for the sake of their children, but might not know where to start.

American Heritage Girls (AHG, www.americanheritagegirls.org), one of the nation's premier scout-type organizations for girls ages five through 18, has been providing age-appropriate, Christ-centered programming for nearly three decades. When it comes to generational traumas, AHG Founder and Executive Director Patti Garibay knows the importance of addressing any negative history that might impact a girl and her future.

"No parent wants to find out their girl has experienced trauma, let alone trauma that stems from their own family," says Garibay. "It's our job to protect her from mental, emotional and physical wounds. Whether a family struggles with the tension of addiction, unfaithfulness, abuse or a history of rejecting God, these issues can directly impact a girl's development, and even her faith journey. It's vital that parents not only identify and address any generational trauma for the wellbeing of their daughters, but also seek the guidance of trusted friends and family."

*Garibay* recently spoke with Christian counseling legend June Hunt on *AHG's* groundbreaking new podcast, *Raising Godly Girls (RGG)*. Hunt's organization, Hope for the Heart, is a ministry dedicated to providing Biblical counsel and practical help to individuals facing life's challenges. In the episode, Garibay and Hunt delve into the complex issues of overcoming generational trauma and sin, offering insights on achieving mental wellness through a biblical worldview. AHG Troops are located in local communities across the nation. If none exists in a given area, families can bring the AHG Program to their own area. An American Heritage Girls Troop Development Coach is available to provide resources to potential Charter Organizations and other families to form a new Troop. Today, there are <u>Troops</u> in all 50 states and girls being served in 15 countries around the globe. Girls can join a Troop at any time; if a Troop is not available nearby, they can become a <u>Trailblazer</u> and enjoy the *AHG* program alongside their parents. A variety of Christian denominations are also represented as <u>Charter</u> <u>Organizations</u> for Troops. Thousands of volunteer members across the country are helping girls grow in their faith, cultivate a heart for service, enjoy the great outdoors, and have more fun than they can imagine.

AHG offers various resources under "Raising Godly Girls," including a weekly podcast, one-minute radio features, a blog, and guides for parents. All "Raising Godly Girls" platforms and materials offer guidance and biblically based advice on various topics affecting girls today, such as bullying, identity, anxiety, and body image issues.
